Delegation - Monica Couture, Saskatchewan School Boards Association

The Board of Education received a presentation from Monica Couture of the Saskatchewan School Boards Association Legal Council, focused on LAFOIP (The Local Authority Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act). Monica provided a helpful overview of the duties and responsibilities of school divisions when it comes to protecting personal information and responding to public records requests. The session supported the Board's ongoing commitment to transparency, accountability, and safeguarding the privacy of students, staff, and families.

SCC Engagement

Northwest School Division leadership recently gathered feedback from School Community Council (SCC) members to better understand what types of engagement would be most meaningful for their councils. In response, the Board of Education and NWSD administration will support opportunities for SCC members to connect through an SCC Edsby group, creating a space to share ideas, questions, and best practices across communities.
